

New Historical Sign Marks Rankin Mule Barn and Home Site

The first historical marker in Tarkio was unveiled in November 2017. The new sign shows where David Rankin's iconic mule barn and home once stood, at the corner of Park and 10th Streets.

A pioneer farmer and entrepreneur, David Rankin (1825-1910) was the eldest of nine children. He left school at age 11 to help support his family. Starting with nothing, he persevered through hard work, instinct and risk-taking to build a business. He began with farms in Illinois, then open range ranching in Nebraska, and, finally, established farming operations that eventually involved more than 24,000 acres in Atchison County and the surrounding area.

In addition to his nationally recognized farming success and innovations in agriculture, he helped found the town of Tarkio and Tarkio College. He also helped to bring the railroad to eastern Atchison County, and established a bank, manufacturing plant, utilities, as well as other ventures and community institutions.

Built in 1892, the 114-foot tall, octagonal brick barn became a landmark for the town and the region. Originally constructed to house mules or horses, hay and farmhands, it burned in 1907 but was quickly rebuilt. It entered its second life in the 1970s, when it was declared a national historic place and became the home of Tarkio College's theatre program until the barn burned in 1989.

The mansion was built in 1890 as an expansion of one of the first homes in Tarkio. Occupied by Rankin family members until about 1932, it served as the residence of Tarkio College's president from 1932 to 1948. It was razed in 1958.

The two-sided, cast aluminum marker, manufactured by Sewah Studios of Marietta, OH, has been placed along Park Street, near the North Polk School museum that stands on the actual site of the mansion.

The marker was developed jointly by Rankin descendants and the Mule Barn Theatre Guild. Representing the family at the marker's unveiling was Gayle Hanna Alexander '66, of Lincoln, NE, a great-granddaughter of David Rankin, while Anne Amthor, Tarkio, officiated on behalf of the Mule Barn Theatre Guild.

Local donors to the marker included: Mule Barn Theatre Guild, Tarkio Chamber of Commerce, Tarkio Lions Club, Tarkio Rotary Club and the City of Tarkio. Descendants of all four of David Rankin's children contributed to the marker.

From Tarkio College President:

Dear Friends,

We continue to move forward with our application for certification of Tarkio College as an approved school of higher education in Missouri. Several things still need to be addressed. First, and foremost, we must show that we have the funds to cover the first year's operating deficit. Once we have these funds accumulated then we will be able to finalize the certification. The next item was the addition of technical classes for various trade certifications. The greatest demand in Northwest Missouri is for technical training, including welding, plumbing, electrical and HVAC. One of our goals is to provide the training needed by the community, so we have modified our application to include some of these trades. In the future, we will add computer technology, wind energy technology and various medical technologies.

Please be assured that your alumni association and those selected to lead the college are working diligently towards our shared goals. Much of the work already done has been completed by volunteers. We can always use volunteers, but if you can't volunteer we ask for your continued financial support. We have even started a plan to protect your donation. Any donation over \$5,000.00 which is designated for Tarkio College can, if you so choose, be placed in a restricted account which mandates that the funds cannot be used until Tarkio College receives certification. If, for some reason, Tarkio College does not receive certification the funds would be promptly returned to you. Now that's the type of assurance which gives you confidence that your donation will not be wasted. Donations under \$5,000.00 will continued to be used for current operating needs such as utilities, insurance and supplies, as we move towards certification.

Tarkio History Lessons

J. David Martin '66, Georgetown, TX, sent us an interesting article on **Edgar Lee Hewitt** '? who was an early archeologist and anthropologist whose focus was on Native Americans in New Mexico and the Southwestern United States. He is best known for his role in gaining passage of the Antiquities Act, a pioneer in the conservation movement and the founder of the Museum of New Mexico. He had dealings with Maria Martinez, the famous potter, and helped establish the center of Native American pottery. He also helped establish the Bandelier National Monument and Chaco Culture National Historical Park.

Shirley Martin McLaren '53, Harrisburg, PA, sent us an article she found regarding her great-uncle, **William Thomas Little '13**. Alumnus Little was also a graduate of Xenia Theological Seminary and was the first Presbyterian theological student to enter the service of his country and to give his life in WW1 on October 1, 1918 in France.
