Report to the Corporation September 18, 2022

Before we present the special award tonight, I want to say a little about your alumni association before I ride off into the sunset.

Too often we have failed to brag on ourselves or to credit ourselves for what we have done the last thirty years since the original closing of TC. I would like to rectify some of that tonight by recalling what the Alumni Association has done.

TCAA waited patiently for the legal process to wind down in the early nineties, and then she took the next step to revitalize the Tarkio College Corporation, form new by-laws and elect a separate board of directors and hire a new president, Bob Hughes, who served faithfully with little compensation for a number of years. In the process, TCAA became the owner of the campus when it was deeded over to us by Heartland. Bob and Mary helped raise the initial \$300,000 that allowed to get the doors reopened with what we promised would be a gateway to a combined tech and academic program.

TCAA is responsible for the major restoration of Rankin Hall. Without TCAA, this building would have crumbled. Our alumni began working on Work Weekends years ago to restore this beloved building when we inherited it. The midnight riders come from PA, driving all night, and then working all weekend, driving back to regular jobs on Sunday. Thank you, Bob and Wayne. Locals such as Snake, Dan and Don restored wood work and painted here, there and everywhere sometimes to the detriment of their health. Muriel came all the way from Washington State to help. I cooked all weekend with the help of Gloria and Sheridan. I am sure I am leaving others out, but these were your faithful leaders, and we owe ALL who worked so hard to make the restoration possible. The gardens have also been restored by alumni and friends. Another alum sent money for the restoration of the library. Let us also not forget that the alums helped restore Thompson with the same type of elbow grease and funding.

Not only did TCAA contribute physical labor to the restoration of the campus, she and our alums helped with financial contributions for the restoration also. We paid for the restoration of the stained glass windows in the Chapel. We paid over \$40,000 for the Lexan for the outside window protection, and we paid almost \$45,000 for the restoration of the slate roof. We understand that the flat roof problems are being addressed for which we are grateful. One of our board members paid for the new curtain in the Chapel. The new organ was a gift through the family of a board member.

TCAA deeded over the campus to TC at no cost to them. All TCAA asked in return was the use of the museum, offices, and meeting rooms on second floor Rankin. TC now has control of the campus.

Once again, thank you to ALL who have worked so hard over these past years. You might now ask "what have you done for us lately?" Here's this year's report of activities:

- 1) TCAA pays a monthly stipend to TC to help with expenses
- 2) TCAA bought a window in Rankin recently to help with that project
- 3) TCAA representatives have attended several graduation ceremonies and presented certificate graduates with a TCAA tee shirt and pen and a welcome to the Association packet.
- 4) TCAA continues to award a scholarship each year to the child or grandchild of alum.
- 5) TCAA sponsors and prepares Homecoming Weekend. This is a major task and neither Muriel nor I will be returning to this project so it would be great if some of you here would volunteer to help.
- 6) TCAA maintains an active Facebook page and sends out the Phoenix to dues payers. I will no longer be doing the Phoenix, so again; we need someone to step up to the plate if you wish this to continue.
- 7) Last, but not least, our two intrepid souls, Gloria and Elaine, are working diligently to organize the museum and archive thousands of documents. We especially thank Gloria for getting this rolling and installing our detection cameras.

What Made Tarkio College Different From Other Colleges?

Its faculty and administrators were devoted followers of Jesus Christ and lived the Golden rule.

The college offered financial aid to worthy students in the form of no interest student loans — many who would be the first in their families to receive a college education and degree. This totally changes a family's dynamics. I have had several friends who experienced this, and I am part of an organization that helps this happen today. Each of these first-generation college students has an awesome story to tell about the effect of their advanced education on their outlook on life, their family's outlook on the value of education, raising the student's self esteem, and, in many cases striking a path for younger siblings to follow.

As a student, I worked part-time to pay my tuition in Jim Shaum's business office and sent "duns" to students who were not paying back these student loans.

As the daughter of a pastor, I was given a ministerial discount on my tuition, which aided me in getting my degree. Pastors were very poorly paid in those days. A state school would not have offered this discount to pastor's and missionary's kids.

Tarkio College's graduating teachers were well-trained. As such, several major school districts in the nation would almost automatically hire a first-year teacher with a degree from Tarkio and an accompanying recommendation from the Department of Education. Districts that were noted for hiring TC grads in the 1950's included large cities such as Denver, CO and Milwaukee, WI; others included Beaver, PA, and many near-by towns and districts in Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri.

Tarkio College sent more than its fair share of students to the ministry and to the mission field. The majority of these ministerial students became ordained Presbyterian pastors. Many of these pastors and missionaries met their future wives at Tarkio College — adding to the number of kingdom workers. A search of the archive records of the PCUSA would give some statistics about the number of pastors who received their undergrad degrees from TC.
